Each year thousands of reading groups in schools and libraries in the UK and around the world get involved in the Yoto Carnegie Awards, with children and young people 'shadowing' the judging process.

As always, Mrs Holmes the NCW librarian, shared The Yoto Carnegie Medal for Writing Shortlist 2024 with students and staff. The Book Group enjoyed devouring the books and discovering new authors. A firm favourite with students was "The Song Walker" by Zillah Bethell.

The ceremony was held at the Cambridge Theatre in London, which stages "Matilda the Musical". It was even more magical when the character Mrs Phelps (Miss Honey in the Roald Dahl Book) helped host the ceremony and the songs from the famous musical were played in the background.

Students and staff enjoyed front-row seats - sitting just behind all the famous authors. Unfortunately, Zillah Bethell was not there but this was soon forgotten when NCW won the sponsor's draw and received a Yoto audiobook player!

The 2024 Yoto Carnegie Shadowers' Choice Medal for Writing went to "Crossing the Line" by Tia Fisher, a story told in verse about a boy whose bad behaviour attracts the wrong crowd and he's sucked into a terrifying new world of drug dealing and violence. The book explores drug crime and county lines and has a message to spread about friendship.

After the ceremony students Jamie and Keziah got to speak with Tia Fisher and Maxwell chatted with Joseph Coelho!

Fabulous Fundraising!

NCW Student Zac has recently completed a huge fundraising challenge to raise funds for a defibrillator for his fitness centre and two charities that are very special to him and his family – LOOK UK and The CVI Society.

Zac took the lead in organising the fundraiser along with his personal trainer. The event was hosted in his home town and the "Coast to Coast" fundraiser challenged Zac, fellow clients and their families/supporters to travel 157km as quickly as they could on a static bike/rower and ski machine.

They set a fundraising challenge of £3,000. This took place one Saturday in June and was such a great event. Over three hours Zac rotated every five minutes on one of the machines and they smashed the distance in under three and a half hours and also smashed the fundraising





target raising in excess of £4,000!

On Celebration Day, Zac handed over a cheque to Jane Ring who accepted it on behalf of Look UK. Zac also visited a representative from the CVI Society to hand over a cheque for their half of the proceeds.

Back in Worcester another young man was planning a different epic challenge!

Sixth Form student Thomas wanted to take on a challenge to mark the end of his time here at NCW whilst also raising money for specific exercise and therapeutic equipment to enhance the experience at NCW.

Thomas and Pete (NCW Sports Therapist) set themselves the challenge of doing 24 hours of non stop exercise, starting at 7:30 pm on Sunday 23rd June finishing at 7:30 pm on Monday 24th June. Needless to say, they took on the challenge with great gusto and not only completed the 24 hours in their stride but also smashed their initial fundraising target of £500 and reached almost £3000!

Throughout the 24 hours they each walked or ran 41.6 miles, did 1000 squats, 500 shoulder presses, 500 leg presses, 500 bicep curls, 500 pec curls, 2 hrs of football and an hour on the exercise bikes! They saw the sun set on Saturday and watched the sun rise on the Sunday morning fuelled by healthy snacks from staff and students and cheered on by their friends! By 7:30 pm on the Monday they had a gym full to the brim with students and staff encouraging them to the finish line!

This young man had left NCW 5 years ago to travel and perform. He ended up travelling across Europe completely independently before doing a degree in popular music. He performed original songs and imaginative re-workings of familiar songs with just his guitar for accompaniment and was amazingly good. He told the audience that he would not have had the skills and confidence to do this without everything he had learned from NCW. It gave him the springboard he needed to follow his dream.

Celebrating 75 years of the Commonwealth

We are delighted to announce that NCW will be included in a book celebrating 75 years of the Commonwealth which will be launched at Westminster Abbey.

26th April 2024 marked the official 75th anniversary of the Commonwealth and NCW is to be included in one of the most ambitious and authoritative academic projects in British history to celebrate this great occasion.

The History of Parliament Trust has announced a new publication

entitled "The Commonwealth at 75", which is to be launched in October. NCW will feature in the book and a representative is also invited to attend the launch event at Westminster Abbey.

Exploring the origins, history and impact of the Commonwealth, the fully illustrated publication celebrates the 75th anniversary of the family of nations and the ideas, individuals and organisations who have contributed to its success. NCW has been approached as a thought leader in the field of education for children and young

people with a vision impairment and invited to be part of the project - which will see Principal Rachel Perks represent NCW at the official launch event.

The book also marks the appointment of King Charles III as the Head of the Commonwealth and features the writing of renowned royal authors Robert Jobson and Katie Nicholl, alongside the images of veteran royal photographer Arthur Edwards.

The book launch event is due to take place in October 2024.

NCW Students mapping the way for Railways!

The ability to get around our campus, and the wider world, with confidence is central to the future success of our students. In lessons, the emphasis is on developing transferable skills for life beyond New College Worcester. All of the skills taught are fundamental to enable our students to become confident and competent travellers who can participate in their communities and have a fulfilled lifestyle. As part of our students' mobility lessons, they often venture out to Worcester Foregate Street train station with a Mobility Officer and work on their train skills.

On a recent Mobility lesson, NCW students Lawson and George and NCW Mobility Officer Mrs Jones, discovered a tactile, Braille and large print map of the station. The map enables someone with a vision impairment to successfully navigate around the station and is inclusive to all. Curious to find out more, they spoke to a member of staff at the station and discovered that West Midlands Railway and the RNIB identified and recognised that NCW students use the station frequently. They were keen to improve the customer experience at the station for people with a vision impairment.

The map was designed and completed in conjunction with the help of RNIB and now is proudly displayed at the station.





Green Fingered Gardening!

Last year, NCW student Lawson had the most amazing idea of creating a sensory garden next to the NCW allotment. Supported by staff and with the help of other students, his vision has become a reality and the now well established sensory garden is a quiet space for all to enjoy.

Sensory gardens are sanctuaries for mental and emotional well-being. For individuals coping with stress, anxiety, or mental health issues, the sensory stimulation provided by these gardens can offer a calming and restorative experience.

The NCW sensory garden is in a prime position, tucked away under the shade of a beautiful tree and next to the swimming pool. With a variety of plants aimed to attract the senses, shade from the tree and log seating it is a welcoming space for all. The space offers students and staff the chance to soak up nature, be calm and reflect.

Last week, Lawson took the opportunity in form time to do tours of the garden, explaining the elements to each and every student and encouraging students to use the special area.

Lawson's favourite plants are grasses and lavender as he likes the texture and the sound as the wind moves them.

Lawson has even talked about the garden in this week's "Digging with Dove" which can be heard on the link below. He talks about the garden and even gives cues about the layout of the garden for someone with a vision impairment.

A great day was had by all and ALL the students played amazingly. Khadijah achieved "the Highest Female Scorer" and Zac was crowned "Player of the Day."


